History: The Diocese of St. Louis was erected in 1826 for the entire Louisiana Territory. With substantially reduced area, St. Louis was elevated to an archdiocese in 1947. The St. Louis Archdiocese and its predecessor included the following missions, parish, and schools which served American Indians:

1770-ca.1850s (no longer St. Louis King of France Cathedral/ Indian) Church/Mission (various and Métis), St. Louis, Missouri 1824-1831 (closed) (St. St. Regis Seminary (various), Florissant, Louis, 1826-1831) Missouri 1836-1841 (closed) Kickapoo Mission and School (Kickapoo), Missouri 1839-1847 (closed) Sugar Creek Mission and School (Potawatomi), Kansas 1841-1850 (transferred to St. Mary Mission (Salish), Bitter Root River, Diocese of Nesqually) Montana 1847-1849 (closed) St. Francis Regis Mission (Miami), Missouri 1847-1870 (no longer Osage Mission and School, Kansas Indian) (St. Louis, 1847-1850) 1848-1870s (no longer St. Mary Mission and School (Potawatomi), St. Indian) (St. Louis, Marys, Kansas 1848-1850)

## History of St. Louis King of France Cathedral

1770-ca.1850s (no longer Various priests established and administered St.

Indian) Louis King of France Cathedral/Church/ Mission (various and Métis), St. Louis, which had included a few American Indian parishioners

1809 (December 28) Reverend Urbain Guillet, O.C.S.O. baptized Jean
Baptiste "Pompey" Charbonneau (1805-1866), son of

Toussaint Charbonneau and Sacagawea [Sacajawea]

(Shoshoni)

1831 Narcisse (Salish) and Paul (Salish), from a Salish

Indian delegation in Montana, died and were buried in the St. Louis Catholic cemetery

Description: Records (copies), re: St. Louis Archdiocesan history copied by Reverend Souvay (former President of Kenrick Seminary) in archives throughout Europe and the United States. Records relating to Indian mission and school activities include portions of the following:
